COVID-19 Response

The pandemic triggered a change in the strategy of 'project mode' to 'humanitarian relief'. The challenges were multi-dimensional, requiring an immediate response. The responses had to be mobilized outside the 'project-mode' and could not be structured around predefined indicators or milestones.

Collaboration was no longer a choice but an imperative; we needed to work with the government, Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs), civil society organizations (CSOs) and donor agencies to be effective in disaster management. With the COVID-19 outbreak, we saw the need to engage with diverse sections of the community, including the elderly, pregnant and lactating mothers, migrant workers and vulnerable households such as the handicapped and the single women.

Jharkhand Vikas Parishad swiftly developed methodologies to engage with all sections in purposive dialogues and created templates of action agenda to pursue. It has developed a framework of actions that called for performing tasks way beyond its forte.



ts deep community connection and partnerships with multiple stakeholders helped in rapidly building an effective response. We had run COVID awareness drives and distributed ration kits to 4257 families in 65 villages.

The organization has generated awareness in the local dialect, posters, and flex at the main center of the village, educating local communities on precautions measures. 3-layer mask has been distributed among 30,000 community people of 75 villages.

Project Objectives

Objective 1: 60% Marginalized families have increased their income by 20% through small and marginal farmers' organization, various adaptive initiatives (on-farm, off-farm & forest) and linkages.

Objective 2: By the end of year women participates actively in governance by demanding their rights, entitlements and perform their social and constitutional duties with responsibility.

Objective 3: Improved maternal and child health care by strengthening of Health system for Routine Immunization.

Objective 4 – Enhanced ability of adolescents, both girls and boys, to make decisions about matters, be it psychological, familial, social, or economical, that affect their lives.

Outcomes

- Involvement of 233 farmers for second crop cultivation.
- 249 households have kitchen garden.
- 87 farmers started mixed cropping. They have cultivated Yam, Turmeric, Colocassia, Ginger.
- 150 farmers are using their own herbal pest repellent.
- 11 women benefited of social security schemes.
- 177 farmers taking environment friendly action. Like soil and water management, plantation, protecting forest.
- 81 adolescent girls developed as a leader.
- 130 girls are made aware of sexual and reproductive health.
- Adolescent groups have motivated parents of their peers (2) about right age of marriage. Thus 2 girls saved from early marriage.
- 72 girls gained knowledge about their self-security.
- 7 adolescents linked with vocational training.



Micro Watershed Management

Most life on earth depends upon soil as a direct and indirect source of food. The rapid erosion of soil due to heavy rain and winds causes problems for humans since it began cultivation. The absence of soil and water conservation measures heavily influences the agriculture productivity for the farmers who are dependent upon rain-fed agriculture.

In this context, JVP, aims to enhance the productivity of crops by developing soil fertility and water restoration for irrigation purpose. Its strategy emphasizes on 'Ridge to Valley approach' for land and water development.

Over the years, JVP has gained vast experience of developing micro watershed in Nipania village. This strategy has generated awareness among community for conservation of their own resources.



Activities undertaken

232 contour trenches excavated.

15 Gully Plug constructed checked runoff water.

14 Farm ponds constructed have generated irrigation facilities

1500 feet farm bund made to check soil erosion.

1600 fruits and teak trees were planted.



Enhanced Natural Resource Management through Assets creation

Project Goal: Enhanced Natural Resource Management through Assets creation

Objective 1: Improved cultivation by creating of land management (Resilience)

Objective 2: Smallholder farmers, landless and most marginalized section engaged in orchard development (Productivity)

The project implemented in one village named a Nipania in Amrapra block at Pakur District. The district is surrounded by raajmahal hills. The major tribes in the district are santhal and paharia.

Construction of Field Embankment to check runoff water and soil erosion – 13-hectare land developed as field embankment through boulder check. The creation of measure help to check run off water for cultivation of second crop.

Plantation: 10 families having 0.50 dismil land supported for orchard development. Mainly Mango and high-density Guava (L9) planted in barren land. Each farmer provided with 25 fruit plants, which after 3-4 years start bearing fruits. It will create additional income for the families.



74 Pahariya Families and 154 families have created assets namely field embankment, contour trench, gully plug, 30*40model, pond (60*40), gully plug, and water supply through pipeline and plantation.

All these resources checked the forced migration of families.

Soil and Water Conservation activities checked the flow of water. As a result, cultivation in summer and second crop cultivation were made possible in the area.

Farmers started cultivation vegetables during rabi season. Earlier they used to cultivate only in kharif.

Easy availability of drinking water for 18 families.

Gram Sabha taking a lead role in protection of community forest land.



Adolescent Development Program

Project Objectives:

Advancing girls' leadership by working directly with girls

Mobilizing families, communities, and influencers

Villages - 12 in Litipara Block

Outcomes:

The training on sexual and reproductive health along with HIV and AIDS resulted as 130 peer educators made aware of correct way of using sanitary napkin and its proper way of dispose it.

Adolescents are taking vegetables regularly.

Married adolescents' girls are in contact of Sahiya for necessary guidance related to birth spacing.

Thirty peer educators are made aware of HIV and AIDS. They gained knowledge about syringe and its disposal, spread through HOV infected person (blood transmission), infected pregnant mother to children.

Five married adolescent girls named as Sarita Hansda, Soni Murmu, Thakran Kisku, Urmila Hansda and Anita Hansda strated small eatery shop at their own place. Chito Murmu (HJitko village), Mery Murmu (Paderkela village), Monica Soren (Paderkela village), Rajmurni Murmu (Jabjitpur) cultivated vegetables as income generation purpose.

Eleven girls got admission at Kasturba Gandhi School.



Outcomes

Cross learning visit among adolescent groups encouraged members to learn from each other. Koyal Group from Kamardiha village met with members of Kamalful from Kalajhor village. The members of shared among themselves that group meeting helped them to become vocal. They are sharing their ideas, opinions and taking action for self-development.

Group meetings also developed them to take social action. As a result, they volunteer during pandemic for distribution of ration and awareness generation. Interface meeting with ANM, teachers and Sahiya opened a platform to share the challenges in the area.

Revati Murmu, a teacher from Upgraded middle school shared toilets with proper water facilities recently provided in her school.

19 adolescents' girls tapped the benefits of Sukanya Ladli Yojna (2021-2022). 37 girls received Tetanus Toxoid vaccine.
